Chairperson Overview

Reviewing all of the activities of SOSCN over this year I am struck by how much we manage to get done with a small number of core staff, but a large and highly engaged membership. As a board we are pleased to see the foundational aims of SOSCN to address disadvantage being met and reflected in developing new Scottish Government policies for out of school care.

I know my own service has learned and improved through training and Achieving Quality Scotland (AQS), and much of this was freely available through the core government funding of SOSCN or Glasgow and other councils in Scotland sponsorship of AQS.

As a Board, we have to be mindful of the funding climate for organisations like SOSCN, which cannot be fully funded through government grants and has to ensure income is generated to help cover costs. This means that some previously free or very low cost training and events will need to be charged for in the future and we hope the membership will understand and support this as a measure to keep your national organisation sustainable for the future. I thank the membership and the wide range of organisations and individuals across the country who work in partnership with SOSCN and who deliver such essential services to children and their families.

Chief Executive Overview

We are pleased to report considerable progress on our longstanding aim for the development of a national policy framework for out of school care in Scotland. This year we took part in many activities around the development of this new policy, including providing our expertise, research, contacts and views to the Scottish Government Out of School Care Team, holding seven regional Shaping the Framework events in partnership with them, participation in the national reference group for out of school care, and sub groups set up to inform the policy, and keeping you all updated via our website, social media, and newsletters. (As part of this work, looking ahead, June 2019 saw the establishment of a new 3 million pounds fund by the Scottish Government, over 2020/22 to invest in pilots and models of delivery of out of school care which addresses disadvantage and promotes the social inclusion of the least well-off families and children in our communities.)

This period also saw the fruition of Glasgow City Council's investment to support the quality improvement of Glasgow services by investing in SOSCN's Achieving Quality Scotland (AQS) Quality Improvement Framework. Through this funding a total of 22 services achieved AQS Gold Award. We know that most of the participating services have gained higher Care Inspection grades as a result of their hard, but worthwhile, work. Congratulations to all for their well deserved awards.

Our events and training, from the Orkney Isles to the Scottish Borders, focused on children's wellbeing, including supporting children with autism and additional support needs, and those facing Adverse Childhood Experiences. From across the country, feedback on this training is consistently high, while we celebrated a close partnership with CALA in delivering our ongoing physical activity training across the Highlands. We successfully delivered the final training & research with children STEM Champions project and results are highly positive from all involved. We also consulted children and parents directly and out of school care is highly valued by parents and children, as it should be, knowing you are all trying hard to make your services the best they can be for children and families in the communities you serve.

Who We Are

The Scottish Out of School Care Network (SOSCN) is the national infrastructure umbrella organisation providing support, mentoring, training, information and resources to all childcare services in Scotland, which provide childcare, play and learning opportunities for school-age children.

OSC in Scotland

The out of school care sector is the largest provider of play opportunities for school-aged children. There are 1014 OSC services in Scotland, for 748 this is their main service. There are 661 breakfast clubs and 472 holiday services. This provides a total of 53,600 registered childcare places.

In 2018 to 2019 we worked directly with 383 services and 1,291 staff in research, training and events, and all the staff & services involved have a potential reach of over 21,000 families and 25,000 children.

We also worked directly with 1,082 children and 298 parents through consultation processes.

We held 8 events across the country for over 320 attendees representing over 14,000 children and 12,000 families.

'Seeing the Whole Child' - National learning event, Glasgow, Sep 2018


The aim of this event was to inform and educate on the effects of Adverse Childhood Experiences, how to address children's need for positive caring and understanding relationships, and to explore difference ways of framing children's behaviour.

'Shaping the Framework' - Local engagement events, Nov 2018 - Mar 2019

These events provided updates and networking opportunities from SOSCN, and in close partnership, opportunities for the Scottish Government Out of School Care Policy team to consult with the sector on the new framework for out of school care. There were 7 of these events held across Scotland.



We provided a total of 30 direct training sessions for 388 participants from 102 services across Scotland, with a reach of over 8,500 children and 8,000 families. We also provided additional direct support to 8 services in North Ayrshire, Orkney and Glasgow. In Addition, we trained another 70 staff in STEM skills through our STEM Champions Project, in partnership with West College Scotland. Our E-membership mailings potentially reach 93% of the whole out of school care sector when large multi-site contacts also cascade them to their individual services, some of which are often also represented in our 'service' or 'individual' membership lists.



Communications

We have produced 4 newsletters, 4 social media-round-ups and 6 blog posts. Moreover, 4 consultation responses and 39 free recruitment adverts have been placed on the website. We also provided the Deputy First Minister's office with a mailing list to disseminate their Easter and Summer Maths challenge to OSC services.

We currently have 1,887 followers on twitter and have added 142 new followers 2018-2019. We have had a total of 164,300 impressions on twitter (number of times something shows up in other people's feeds). On facebook we have 766 page likes and 810 followers.

Quality Improvement in Out of School Care

In 2018-2019, there have been 17 AQS awards made; 14 Gold, 2 Silver, and 1 Bronze. There are a further 9 services currently under assessment. We also delivered 11 mentoring sessions.
